OVERNIGHT PARKING ON STREETS, EMPTY LOTS, PARK-WAYS


Effective 11/1/05 the covenants will be enforced regarding this is-This includes all construction sue. equipment and personal vehicles. The process is guite simple: A warning letter will be placed on the on the offending vehicle etc. If not corrected, a letter will be sent from the management company. Finally a fine will be assessed. (The fine has not been determined, however, everyone will be notified when this is decided). Even though our streets are under the jurisdiction of Horry County, the covenants supersede the county, provided the covenants are not less than Horry County's.

LETTERS VS. PHONES CALLS REGARDING VIOLATIONS

It was questioned as to why the Board did not make phone calls to a homeowner rather than have a letter sent, which seems less personal. This was addressed by our attorney. Telephone calls may be misconstrued, misunderstood, or forgotten. Letters prevent this, as well as protect all concerned. Letters also afford a viable tracking tool. It was also stressed that our attorney will only become involved if all attempts to resolve issues have failed.

Gourmet Sweet Potato Classic

"Once you taste this, you won't ever go back to the marshmallow-topped variety! Either peel and cook in the microwave or boil the sweet potatoes. They taste the same no matter how you cook them. So, use the technique that works best for you!" Original recipe yield: 8 servings.

INGREDIENTS:

5 sweet potatoes 1/4 teaspoon salt

1/4 cup butter

2 eggs

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon

1/2 cup white sugar

2 tablespoons heavy cream

1/4 cup butter, softened

3 tablespoons all-purpose flour

3/4 cup packed light brown sugar

1/2 cup chopped pecans

DIRECTIONS:

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C). Lightly grease a 9x13 inch baking dish.

Bake sweet potatoes 35 minutes in the preheated oven, or until they begin to soften. Cool slightly, peel, and mash.

In a large bowl, mix the mashed sweet potatoes, salt, 1/4 cup butter, eggs, vanilla extract, cinnamon, sugar, and heavy cream. Transfer to the prepared baking dish.

In a medium bowl, combine 1/4 cup butter, flour, brown sugar, and chopped pecans. Mix with a pastry blender or your fingers to the consistency of course meal. Sprinkle over the sweet potato mixture.

Bake 30 minutes in the preheated oven, until topping is crisp and lightly browned.

Hanukkah Facts

(khä' nk, —nkä), in Judaism, the Festival of Lights, the Feast of Consecration, or the Feast of the Maccabees; also transliterated Chanukah. According to tradition, it was instituted by Judas Maccabeus and his brothers in 165 to celebrate the dedication of the new altar in the Temple at Jerusalem. The festival occurs in December near the time of the winter solstice, as does Christmas, and lasts eight days. Hanukkah later came to be linked also with a miraculous cruse of oil that burned for eight days, leading to the practice of lighting special Hanukkah candles, one the first evening, two the second, and so on. The eightbranched candlestand (menorah) used in that ceremony is a frequent symbol for the holiday.

Kwanzaa Facts

Kwanzaa was created in 1966 in the U.S. by Maulana Karenga, a professor.

The name Kwanzaa, which means "first fruits of the harvest," comes from the African language of Swahili. Many of the new words you will hear associated with Kwanzaa are Swahili words.

During Kwanzaa seven candles are placed in a kinara (kee-nar-rah), which is a wooden candle holder. For each day of Kwanzaa, one candle is lighted to celebrate a special principle. These principles come from beliefs held by families in many parts of Africa.

The seven principles of Kwanzaa are: unity, self-determination, responsibility, cooperative economics, purpose, creativity, and faith.

On each of the seven days, families will participate in an activity which symbolizes that day's principle.
